INTRODUCTION

CHIEF EXECUTIVE'S REPORT

Kei āku nui, kei āku rahi. He mihi manahau ki a kōutou kātoa. To all voices and our many affiliations. Cheerful greetings to you all.

The global pandemic continued to impact Volleyball
New Zealand and our partners as we navigated alert
levels and how events could be adapted. The scale
of our large national events brings hundreds of people
together in a celebration of fun, ihiihi, celebration, skill
and enjoyment, but covid-19 does not respect the value
we place on these events and a number of events at all
levels had to be scaled back or cancelled. This also
impacted athletes and coaches at a national level who
were unable to travel internationally and represent their country.

A key focus in the first 6 months of 2020 – 2021 was the Strengthen and Adapt Plan that Volleyball New Zealand submitted to Sport New Zealand as part of a transformational project to review and reimagine Volleyball in New Zealand as part of a generational change. The opportunity to consult widely, to listen, to share and to present back the findings over this period provide strong connections for Volleyball New Zealand during this time. An unseen positive outcome was the resulting clarity in focus of Volleyball New Zealand Vision and Purpose and role within the community. This will become a part of the new strategic plan. The result from the proposal was a mini mobile workforce working in South and West Auckland and Porirua to promote connections between volleyball providers, existing sports sector infrastructure and local community networks to enable more opportunities to play and amplify informal volleyball. The workforce is needs based, locally led and decentralized. A special thanks to all of those that contributed to the planning and thinking that became a part of the Strengthen and Adapt submission.

We are delighted to announce the recruitment of Jason Lochhead to Volleyball NZ as our High Performance Coaching Director. Jason was an outstanding national representative playing across the world with other top New Zealand beach athletes, but he also has an international coaching pedigree having coached Vanuatu and US national teams including at the Tokyo Olympics. Jason will return to NZ later on in the year to begin training with Commonwealth Games athletes and overseeing the VNZ performance programme for Beach and Indoor.

The New Zealand Beach tour was a highlight although without international teams and avoiding the covid impact. With Olympic qualification on the line, partnerships changed amongst the women's teams adding another dynamic to the event. Men's partnerships were relatively stable through the tour events. The highlight for Beach athletes was the Continental Cup semis and finals held in Thailand in June 2021, a month out from the Olympic Games and delayed a year due to covid. Our athletes performed tremendously well in trying circumstances with an international pandemic going on around them.

Whilst not qualifying for the Olympics, athletes performed well on the international stage at a number of events in Europe post Olympics.

The National Volleyball League was a brand new concept created as a performance step in indoor volleyball. Four teams and brands were created with top coaches putting up their hands and utilising a draft system to select the best players to compete in this 2 weekend event.

Played in Auckland and Christchurch, with quality live streaming. Good crowds attended the event, with excellent volleyball and corporate tables a feature on the Saturday night at the Auckland event.

VNZ have spent some considerable time creating a coaching framework and plan which is underpinned by the latest coach education and research and is designed to meet the needs of all coaches. Input towards this was made by a dedicated group of internal, external and international contributors. Setting this framework apart are the core beliefs of our coach development system (in English and Te Reo), an understanding that there is strong formal and informal learning as a coach and the commitment to extension knowledge for our coaches.

Working alongside Sport NZ, it became clear early that the Youth and U17 programmes of costly international tours were not conducive to the best development of our young athletes and many were impacted by de-selection. The development of Next Generation, a complete provision of skill development, nutrition, mental skills and strength and conditioning created by experts in youth development will provide highly skilled and capable athletes ready for Junior and U19 representative programmes in both Beach and Indoor volleyball.

With a population of 1.6 million, it was clear that there needed to be more conduits from VNZ into the Auckland community to enable greater participation, growth and connectivity. Working with the volleyball community in Auckland, the RST's - Sport Auckland and Sport Waitakere, WECA (Waitakere, East, Central Auckland) was created. A milestone in history was made as their first representative teams attended IPC in Wellington in 2021.

Associations continued to work hard to adapt and change up their delivery to work within the frameworks allowable through covid-19. Our particular thanks to those volunteers who gave countless hours to re working events and leagues to enable people to continue playing the game they love.

We thank our commercial partners sincerely who have chosen to support volleyball. Our sincere thanks to Richard and John Fowler, our Honorary Solicitors, who have given much time to Volleyball to assist in legal and constitutional matters. Our thanks to Gilbert Enoka, All Blacks Manager and past New Zealand Volleyball representative, as Patron and Claire Stewart, previous New Zealand indoor captain, NZ Beach representative and previous VNZ Board Chair, as President.

To the Volleyball Board, particularly to Donna Milne who stepped down this year, our sincere thanks for the time and effort you dedicate as volunteers to Volleyball New Zealand.

To the small but capable team within the Volleyball New Zealand office, thank you for your tireless effort to serve the volleyball community across NZ. To Dave Keelty who moved on after 2 years of great service, we wish you all the very best.

CHAIR REPORT

The VNZ Board would like to extend our warmest wishes to you, members of the volleyball whānau. While the year has continued to be disrupted by COVID-19, it is the collective resilience and achievements of the volleyball community that define who we are.

In the year through to June 2021, VNZ progressed many of its strategic priorities and volleyball has demonstrated it is a growth sport, despite the wider sports sector experiencing decreasing participation. We celebrated notable growth in participation, workforce capability and visibility of the game. The 26% increase in secondary school participation numbers in 2021 is a testament to everyone across the country who ignites passion for volleyball in our rangatahi. We also saw record participation of 179 teams in New Zealand Secondary Schools in beach and a new competition for our performance athletes, with the successful launch of the National Volleyball League. Significant efforts went in to assisting our Beach Ferns and Beach Blacks to prepare and compete in the Continental Cup Finals in Thailand. VNZ's focus on elevating the capability of the whole of volleyball has seen new opportunities for administrators, coaches and referees to connect and develop, including online Association and chair resources. Additionally, visibility of volleyball has accelerated over the past year, including a 15% and 5% increase in online streaming hours and television sports coverage, respectively.

The Chief Executive's report and other sections of the Annual Report describe the full breadth of volleyball activity over the past year. The Board acknowledges the outstanding leadership of Toni-Maree Carnie and VNZ staff and congratulates Toni-Maree on her appointment by the President of FIVB to the International Development Commission. Appointed with 9 other leaders from across the 222 international federations, this Commission provides leadership in improving the sport on a global level. Thank you to the collective leadership and commitment of many school, club, social and regional volunteers for volunteering your time and expertise in your local volleyball community. Particularly, to Donna Milne who recently retired after 6 years of irreplaceable service to VNZ and the volleyball community in driving volleyball's success.

CHAIR REPORT

As the year progressed, VNZ was invited to participate in the first wave of Sport New Zealand's Strengthen and Adapt initiative. The high level of community engagement and ideas generated during this process provided an excellent insight into the state of the game in New Zealand and future opportunities for volleyball. VNZ immediately acted on the opportunity provided and negotiated new funding from Sport New Zealand to support Pacific community volleyball.

The legacy of Strengthen and Adapt is that it forms the basis of the new VNZ Strategic Plan 2022-2030 (in draft at the time of writing) which ensures the themes and ideas will be implemented and resourced over many years to come. Developing the strategic plan has been a major project on the Board's work plan for 2021.

Despite the uncertainties of COVID-19, strong financial management saw a balanced end of year financial result. A highlight being the ongoing diversification of revenue streams, including increased revenue from commercial partnerships and new investment from Fēdēration Internationale de Volleyball. Specifically, this new revenue has been invested in recruiting a High Performance coach, online video analysis and athlete development opportunties. A full financial report is available elsewhere in the Annual Report.

More recently, the Board begun the Governance Mark process. This is a long-term development programme designed to move the Board forward in undertaking our governance role. This demonstrates the Board's commitment to optimising Board performance to the benefit of members and the volleyball community. The Board is privileged to serve the volleyball community and Board members have worked with diligence and enthusiasm - thank you to Jock Muley, Bevan Erueti, Donna Milne, Lauren Fluery, Sila Avuaa and Jud Hadfield for volunteering your time and expertise on the Board. Additionally, thank you to Claire Stewart, recently appointed VNZ President, Gilbert Enoka, VNZ Patron, and Richard Fowler, VNZ Honorary Lawyer, who generously contribute to the leadership of VNZ.

It has been a year of connecting across many levels of the volleyball ecosystem and forming new and stronger relationships with strategic partners, for the greater good of the volleyball community, and we can look forward with confidence that volleyball will continue to realise it's growth potential.

The release of the **VNZ Strategic Plan 2018-2021** heralds an exciting era, setting out a revitalised approach to leading, enhancing and celebrating volleyball in Aotearoa New Zealand.

The Plan features four pillars:

- A focus on **Growing the Game**, providing and promoting quality volleyball experiences and strengthening connections and partnerships within and outside our sport;
- A participant-centred approach to **Playing the Game**, increasing enjoyment and maximising potential through participation, development and performance;
- A commitment to Our People, engaging and supporting passionate staff, officials and volunteers who develop and deliver volleyball throughout New Zealand; and
- An expectation of **Operational Excellence**, optimising resources and utilising technology to ensure the relevance and effectiveness of VNZ for its members.

Within each pillar, there are specific goals and initiatives; these are the priorities that will be the focus of the next three years (while acknowledging the inter-connections and dynamic nature of the Plan). Core values are defined, that are expected to weave throughout the Plan and guide all activity; these are integrity, wellbeing, accessibility and collaboration. Further communication will set out the key performance indicators that will signal success.

Earlier in the year stakeholders were asked to share their thoughts about volleyball in New Zealand, about how VNZ is doing, and what could be done better. Thank you to the large number of people who responded to the survey. Collectively your feedback provided a wealth of valuable insights, ideas and information that has influenced and shaped the VNZ Strategic Plan 2018-2021. (See summary at right)

Survey summary...

Volleyball is an **inclusive** game, with different codes and formats, that is enjoyed by many people across cultures, ages, genders and locations throughout New Zealand.

The strength of volleyball at school level was highlighted, as was the opportunity to develop initiatives to enable school leavers to remain engaged with the sport, and for our performance athletes to take advantage of scholarship opportunities.

There was a strong message that many passionate people and volunteers contribute to our sport and the volleyball experience. Doing better at connecting with and developing our people and volunteers, particularly at a grass roots level, was also identified as an opportunity.

Variation in capability and function of different associations and regions was identified, with a number of ideas shared about how to broker the spread of knowledge and development of capability and capacity across the country. The importance of improving communication was a common theme, with some stakeholders feeling disconnected.

The main difference in views was between those who wanted more attention on the performance programme, particularly on athlete development, and those who considered VNZ to be too focused on performance at the expense of grass roots volleyball.

A lack of funding was identified as a critical issue to address in order to maximise the potential of the game at all levels.

Limited access to facilities to train and play was seen as a threat to volleyball, while being able easily to pick up a ball and play, particularly in New Zealand's beautiful outdoor spaces and beaches, was highlighted as an advantage.











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TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT

REFEREE DEVELOPMENT

South Island Referee Report Michael Cop Referee Development Manager

While 2020-2021 was challenging from an in-person perspective, there were three initiatives for referee development that moved forward. The first initiative was traditional to this role in previous years. Courses of all levels (Local, Regional, and National) were offered across the South Island. While some were cancelled for obvious reasons, we still did manage to get referees accredited. In part, the online Local Referee course that was created last year helped in this process. The second initiative continued towards strengthening online resources—an initiative which became increasingly self-evident because of COVID. In conjunction with the NZBT, I created a series of videos and quizzes for basic beach rules. These videos were aimed at the growing population of beach players who (often) need to self-referee. Knowledgeable players also often translate into fewer conflicts on court over rules. The third initiative was to continue creating Regional Referee material that can be used more broadly across the South Island. This material includes videos of ball-handling, blocking, and back row attack faults, asking participants to decide upon such faults. The idea is to give upcoming referees more concentrated opportunities to decide upon caught balls, double contacts, and other faults in low-stake environments before they officiate over more difficult matches.



Referee development continued in the North Island with a number of courses provided. Refereeing is such an integral part of the game of volleyball and the more confident people feel in referring the more enjoyable the game will be for everyone. Demand for referee courses peaks just before major events each year. In an effort to manage demand and to take a different approach due to covid-19, more online courses have been developed.

In an effort to replicate the coach framework, a priority is to develop a network of referee developers and trainers who can lead the development of referees throughout New Zealand without putting considerable strain on just a few referees.

The National Volleyball League provided New Zealand's best referees with a training and development opportunity of a high standard with consistently challenging and demanding games played over 2 weekends. This was an excellent opportunity to referee quality games.

Top national referees continue to mentor and support younger referees at all the VNZ events. Sincere thanks to all of those who have assisted in referring over the past year and particularly those who have mentored and guided the development of our future referees.

COACH DEVELOPMENT

Volleyball NZ welcomed the recruitment of High Performance Beach Coach Jason Lochhead to work closely with Johann Timmer in the coach development and athlete development space. Colleen Campbell continues to work at a strategic level looking for national and international partnerships and opportunities including those with FIVB and High Performance Sport NZ. Her portfolio also sees a priority area of women and girls. Fabi Phaneuf will also be working in coach developer space.

Coach Development Framework

Through months of planning and conversations, Volleyball NZ were pleased to announce its coach development framework. The framework was developed from support of a range of people, including working groups, Sport NZ, and Association leads. We would like to thank all those that contributed in the development of this framework.

The framework will provide Associations with the necessary tools to provide coach development opportunities in their region using qualified coach developers.

Consisting of four awards, Engage, Grow, Develop, and Excel; the framework will allow coaches the flexibility on meeting their needs while also providing structure to deliver critical knowledge needed to support the coaches and athletes to achieve the best volleyball experience possible.

National Volleyball League

The NVL not only provided a great opportunity for athletes to compete but also for top coaches to experience some great competition and development. Throughout the campaign NVL coaches joined together through several discussions, led by Dave Keelty, Colleen Campbell, and national team coaches Mark Doyle and Richard Casutt.

Coach development didn't just stop with the NVL coaches. Several coaches experienced the action up close with thoughts from the above-mentioned coach developers. These coaches were given the opportunity to ask the thoughts of national coaches, deliver their thoughts on the game, all while observing the best players in NZ.

National Coaching Weekend

In February, Butterfly Creek was the destination for all national coaches to engage in discussion in planning and development. The weekend was a great success, allowing all national coaches (beach and indoor) a chance to collaborate and establishing first time connections.

Alongside discussion and planning, the weekend also provided some great learning. Volleyball NZ Patron Gilbert Enoka, Sport NZ Coaching Consultant Andy Rogers, and National Development Manager David Keelty all presented to the 14 coaches on various coaching topics.

This was the first time, in a long period, national coaches from all programmes were able to share their ideas in helping path the way for the future. The coaching weekend was well received, and plans are underway for another workshop early next year.

ATHLETE DEVELOPMENT

Development Camps

Volleyball New Zealand again hosted various development camps around New Zealand. This gave the opportunity for athletes and coaches around New Zealand to develop their skills in a fun environment. Indoor camps were held in January, April, and July in Auckland, Tauranga, Hamilton, Nelson and Dunedin. 376 athletes were in attendance supported by 40 coaches.

A total of four beach volleyball camps were also held in Tauranga and Nelson. 129 athletes attended Tauranga camps while 37 attended the two camps in Nelson. Several coaches were again involved with top beach players such as Mike Watson, Alice Zeimann and Olivia Macdonald also giving back to the youth.

Volleyball NZ also explored the opportunity to work with associations in development opportunities. Volleyball Southland being the first, where support was provided in both coach and athlete development opportunities. Starting in Invercargill, moving into Queenstown and Wanaka, over 70 athletes and 10 coaches were supported in this experience and the feedback was greatly received.

Dynasty Next Gen Camps

With changes in the Youth Space, Dynasty Next Gen Camps are in preparation and will begin October 2021. This is an exciting opportunity for Volleyball NZ to work through the changes that were made following its performance review. These camps will be led by top coaches around NZ while utilizing mental skills, nutrition, and strength and conditioning experts to provide a great opportunity for everyone to grow. Changes to the Youth / U17 space were made in consultation from Sport New Zealand considering issues such as Balance is Better, Youth burnout, over training, de-selection and costs.

VOLLEYFEST

Volleyfest is designed to reduce barriers, connect with the community by providing a fun and safe environment with a focus on meeting the needs of women and girls through a grass based modified volleyball experience. Northland, Manukau Auckland, Manawatu and Canterbury Associations hosted over 24 Volleyfest opportunities over the 2020-2021 summer, where over 2,500 participants engaged in local festivals or leagues. With 85% of these participants being new to volleyball.

All four Associations provided a unique Volleyfest experience that met their communities needs. Partnerships and collaboration to achieve the common goal of more people active, more young girls and women engaging in positive sporting experiences was achieved by all 4 Regional associations by:

- Working with local community groups and councils to identify windows of opportunities.
- Collaboration on events with other local sporting codes
- Targeted to meet the needs of first-time participants through exclusive events
- · Connecting with local clubs, to build community connect and develop local capability
- Providing opportunities for leadership, coach, and referee development.
- Fun, Safe, Challenging and Connected events.
- Opportunities for ongoing engagement in local competitions.

Volleyball New Zealand is excited to see the continuation of Volleyfest throughout these communities and encourage other regions to look for opportunities to introduce this fun, family friendly festival to the local communities.



NATIONAL PARTNERSHIPS

Events Cancelled due to Covid-19:

2020 VNZ Inter-Provincial Championships2020 National Tertiary Volleyball Championship53rd VNZ Club Championships 2020

37th North Island and South Island Junior SS Volleyball Championships

The North and South Island Junior SSVC is the first national tournament to commence in 2020 since Covid-19 hit in February. It was great to finally run tournaments again. North Island Juniors was held from 23-26 November at Trustpower Baypark Arena and Queen Elizabeth Youth Centre in Tauranga with 47 boys teams and 53 girls teams representing 54 schools. Trident High School girls team emerged victorious and beating Rangitoto College in 3 sets. Orewa College placed third. For the boys division, Tauranga Boys' College garnered first place. Mt. Maunganui College placed second and Manurewa High School won the bronze medal.

After more than 5 years, the South Island Juniors was held at the ILT Stadium in Invercargill, Southland. From 23-25 November, 31 schools flocked to Southland bringing 17 boys teams and 35 girls teams. For the girls' division, St. Andrew's College placed first, Nayland College came second and Cashmere High School placed third. In the Boys Division, Burnside High School beat Riccarton High School in two straight sets to claim gold, while Shirley Boys' High School wont in three sets against Waimea College to claim third place.

2021 New Zealand Secondary School Volleyball Championships 22 - 26 March 2021, CET Arena and Massey University, Palmerston North

After having to cancel last year's tournament, teams were excited to participate in the 2021 NZSSVC with 96 girls teams filled 6 divisions and 80 boys teams were split into 5 divisions. Schools were heavily oriented with level 2 guidelines as another Covid-19 scare was in place. It was great the tournament was able to commence at level 1. Secondary School teams were also excited to play on the Taraflex floor which was set up as a show court in Fly Arena 2. It was also the first time to schedule all division finals in the main arena which provided quality experience for those from other divisions and for our livestream viewers. Rangitoto College won the Boys Championship while Burnside High School won the Girls Division.

INDOOR EVENTS REPORT

2021 North Island Secondary School Volleyball Cup - Satellite

22 - 24 March 2021, Eventfinda Stadium and Netball North Harbour, North Shore, Auckland

There is a rapid growth in interest for school volleyball and VNZ addressed that by providing a satellite tournament that runs the same week as NZSSVC in March. The satellite tournament hosted 14 boys teams and 16 girls teams. Teams from Northland, Auckland and Bay of Plenty flocked to Auckland to compete in the inaugural tournament.


2021 Volleyball New Zealand Inter-Provincial Championships

Friendly Manager (FM) is a club management software that Volleyball New Zealand has been

This year has been a period wherein VNZ has researched and trialed various Competition Management Systems and IT solutions locally and abroad with the guidance of Sport New Zealand and other national sporting bodies. Friendly manager offered basic volleyball fixtures which was used during the Junior Champs tournaments. From this event, FM developed various fixtures and features from correcting the scoresheets, draws, microsite, results and other backend features that partly lead to the success of a smooth NZSSVC tournament in March.

VNZ continues to work with FM to improve the systems, add features for easy user and admin access, as well as maximise the other features it offers outside Competition Management.





Statement of Accounting Policies

Volleyball New Zealand Incorporated For the year ended 30 June 2021

Basis of Preparation

The society has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the society will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Presentation Currency

The Performance Report is presented in New Zealand dollars (NZ\$) and all values are rounded to the nearest NZ\$.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue from non-exchange transactions

Grants are recognised as income when they are received during the year. If a grant is not fully expended during the year, a commitment is recognised as a note to the extent that such conditions are unfulfilled at the end of the reporting period. Any grant income received in advance of the specific expenditure is also recorded as a liability as grant income unspent.

Donations and grants with no "use or return" condition attached are recorded as revenue in the year they relate to.

Donations and grants with a "use or return" condition attached are recorded as a liability when cash is received, and as the conditions are met the liability is reduced and revenue is recorded.

Donated assets that are significant and have useful lives of 12 months or more are recorded on receipt at readily obtainable values. Other donated assets are not recorded.

Donated goods or services are not recorded.

Fundraising revenue is recorded when cash is received (when there is no "use or return" condition is attached").

Membership fees are recorded as revenue when cash is received. The membership year is from 1 March to 28 February.

Affiliation fees and participation levies are recorded as revenue in the year they relate to.

Revenue from exchange transactions

Sale of goods is recorded when the goods are sold (usually when the goods are received by the purchaser).

Provision of services: income and expenses are recognised at the completion of the event or performance of service.

Interest income is recorded as it is earned.

All other revenue is recorded as it is earned

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

Foreign Currencies

Foreign currency transactions are converted to New Zealand dollars at the exchange rate ruling at the date of the transaction. At balance date foreign monetary assets and liabilities are translated at the closing rate and variations arising from these transactions are included in the Statement of Financial Performance.

Trade Receivables

Trade receivables are initially measured at the amount owed. When it is likely that the amount owed, or some portion, will not be collected, an impairment adjustment is recorded.

Property, Plant and Equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment are initially recognised at cost. Historic cost includes items of expenditure directly attributable to the acquisition of assets and includes the cost of replacements that are eligible for capitalisation when these are incurred.

Items of property, plant and equipment are subsequently measured either under the:

- Cost model: Cost (or fair value for items acquired through non-exchange transactions) less accumulated depreciation and impairment.
- Revaluation model: fair value, less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses recognised after the date of the most recent revaluation.

Valuations are performed with sufficient frequency to ensure that the fair value of a revalued asset does not differ materially from its carrying amount.

Gains and losses on revaluation are recognised in the Statement of Financial Performance.

All other repairs and maintenance expenditure is recognised in the Statement of Financial Performance as incurred.

Depreciation is calculated on a diminishing value basis over the estimated useful life of the asset. The following estimated depreciation rates /useful lives have been used:

Motor vehicles 20% - 30% DV Furniture and fittings 20% DV Office equipment 20% - 67% DV Plant and equipment 10% - 67% DV and 5 - 10 years SL

An item of property, plant and equipment or investment property is derecognised upon disposal or when no further future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in the Statement of Financial Performance in the year the asset is derecognised.

Intangible Assets

Intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortisation and any accumulated impairment loss.

The amortisation rates used are as follows:

CRM System - 2 years straight line

Investments.

Short Term

Short term investments comprise term deposits which have a term of greater than three months and remaining duration less than 12 months and therefore do not fall into the category of cash and cash equivalents.

Lone Term

Long term investments comprise term deposits which have a term greater than three months and remaining duration of greater than 12months.

Financial Instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the society becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the financial instrument.

The society derecognises a financial asset or, where applicable, a part of a financial asset or part of a group of similar financial assets when the rights to receive cash flows from the asset have expired or are waived, or the society has transferred its rights to receive cash flows from the asset or has assumed an obligation to pay the received cash flows in full without material delay to a third party;

and either.

- the society has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset; or
- the society has neither transferred nor retained substantially all the risks and rewards of the asset, but has transferred control of the asset

Financial assets

The society's financial assets are classified as loans and receivables. The society's financial assets include: cash and cash equivalents, short term investments in the form of term deposits, and receivables.

The society's financial assets are classified as loans and receivables.

Receivables are initially measured at fair value plus directly attributable transaction costs and are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment losses.

Impairment of financial assets

At the end of each reporting date the society assesses whether there is objective evidence that a financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired. A financial asset or a group of financial assets is impaired and impairment losses are incurred if there is objective evidence of impairment as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the asset (a "loss event") and that loss event has an impact on the estimated future cash flows of the financial asset or the group of financial assets that can be reliably estimated.

The society first assesses whether there is objective evidence of an impairment of financial assets. If it is determined that there is no objective evidence of impairment of an individually assessed financial asset, it includes the asset in a group of financial assets with similar credit risk characteristics and collectively assesses them for impairment.

If, in a subsequent period, the amount of the impairment loss decreases and the decrease can be related objectively to an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, the previously recognised impairment loss is reversed by adjusting the allowance account.

Financial liabilities

The society's financial liabilities include trade and other creditors (excluding GST and PAYE).

All financial liabilities at amortised cost are initially recognised at fair value (plus transaction costs). Financial liabilities classified as amortised cost are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the entity has an obligation which can be reliably measured at balance date as a result of a past event and it is probable that the company will be required to settle the obligation.

Provisions are measured at the present value of management's best estimate of the expenditure required to settle the obligation at balance date. Movements in the best estimate are recorded in the Statement of Financial Performance.

Leases

Finance lease

Finance leases which effectively transfer to the society substantially all of the risks and rewards incidental to ownership of the leased item are capitalised at the present value of the minimum lease payments. Lease payments are apportioned between the finance charges and reduction of the lease liability so as to achieve a constant rate of interest on the remaining balance of the liability. Finance charges are recognised as an expense in profit and loss.

Employee Benefits

Wares, salaries and annual leave

Liabilities for wages and salaries, and annual leave are recognised in surplus or deficit during the period in which the employee provided the related services. Liabilities for the associated benefits are measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liabilities are settled.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The society is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income Tax

The society is exempt from New Zealand income tax under section CW 46 of the income Tax Act 2007, as a body promoting amateur games or sports.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. Policies have been applied on a consistent basis with those of the previous reporting period.

Significant Accounting Judgements, Estimates and Assumptions

The preparation of the society's financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of revenues, expenses, assets and liabilities, and the accompanying disclosures, and the disclosure of contingent liabilities. Uncertainty about these assumptions and estimates could result in outcomes that require a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets or liabilities affected in future periods.

<u>Judgements</u>

There have been no significant adjustments made by management in the preparation of these financial statements.

Estimates and assumptions

The key assumptions concerning the future and other key sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date, that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next financial year, are described below. The society has based its assumptions and estimates on parameters available when the financial statements were prepared. Existing circumstances and assumptions about future developments, however, may change due to market changes or circumstances arising beyond the control of the society. Such changes are reflected in the assumptions when they occur.

Useful lives and residual values

The useful lives and residual values of assets are assessed using the following indicators to determine potential future use and value from disposal:

- The condition of the asset
- The nature of the asset, its susceptibility and adaptability to changes in technology and processes
- The nature of the processes in which the asset is deployed
- Availability of funding to replace the asset
- Changes in the market in relation to the asset

13. Going Concern (COVID-19)

On 23 March 2020, the New Zealand Government issued an Epidemic Notice under section 5 of the Epidemic Preparedness Act 2006 to combat the threat of the COVID-19 pandemic.

The result of this pandemic has been a substantial reduction in economic activity throughout the world, as governments have introduced measures (such as the closure of all non-essential business and the cancellation of all public events) in a bid to halt, or at least slow, transmission of the virus. At the time of signing the financial statements, there is uncertainty about how much further economic activity will fall and how long the period of reduced economic activity will last.

The Board will continue to monitor the impact of COVID-19 on the company but at the date of signing this report the Board maintain the view that the Society has sufficient resources that it will continue to operate as a going concern.

14. Events Subsequent to Balance Date

Subsequent to the balance date, on 17 August 2021, the Government increased its Covid-19 alert level to Level 4 in Auckland for a period of 5 weeks, post which Auckland remains at Alert Level - 3 for a period of 2 weeks. As a part of this, the Society had been required to shut its operations and all staff were required to self-isolate and where possible, work from home.

Given that the restrictions are still in place, management understands that the 2022 financial performance of the Society will be affected but are unable to reliably estimate its impact due to the uncertainty around the duration of the pandemic and its ultimate impact on the Society.
